During 2022-23, work on geodiversity issues has continued, including leading a Geology event for Alford WATCH Group, hosting one site visit by the Ice Age Research Group, engaging with people at Lincolnshire Show, and the review, refresh and reprinting of the Geology of Greater Lincolnshire leaflet.

Access for All:

Defra provided additional grant support for capital projects to help improve access within our nationally protected landscapes. Some £47,651 was provided to the Lincolnshire Wolds AONB as part of a three-year funding programme from 2022-2025, with payments in year one and year three. The grant has been used to help with improving access along the Viking Way and to create a plastic matting reinforced grassed area for cars in Claxby village.

Biodiversity

Work has continued apace on utilising the Greater Lincolnshire Nature Partnership's Biological Records Centre to review and refresh the environmental data for the Lincolnshire Wolds AONB. Important work that will help us as we further develop the Lincolnshire Wolds Nature Recovery Plan.

The LCSP were therefore incredibly pleased to be bought new tools for the group by the Lincolnshire Chalk Streams Trust, thanks to funding through the Catchment Based Approach. Tackling Climate Change on the River Rase

With thanks to the Green Recovery Challenge Fund grant funding the LCSP has been busy in the River Rase catchment installing Natural Flood Management (NFM) interventions to help slow down the overland flow into this chalk stream. The LCSP employed the services of an NFM specialist to help work with four fantastic landowners and two contractors to complete the installation of over 30 leaky barriers in place across several channels in the upper catchment along with several field bunds, an attenuation pond and swales. Lincoln University has installed equipment to help monitor these features to learn more about how they work in this landscape. As part of this Defra funded grant scheme, the LCSP have also been able to engage the community in Market Rasen. Working closely with local Councillor Stephen Bunney, the Rasen Area Environment Group and RiverCare the LCSP organised six well-attended events to help promote and care for the River Rase chalk stream. The funding enabled the purchase of essential tools for the Rasen Area Environment Group.

Advisory visits and landowner liaison

48 visits were undertaken to view plans and proposals on site. For all consultative work, the LWCS look at key issues relating to landscape, nature conservation and access, often complementing advice from other key partners, relevant authorities and organisations. During 2022-23, the LWCS commented on one Woodland Management Plan, 11 Felling Licence Applications and four Environmental Impact Assessments (Agriculture) Regulations. The LWCS and the Forestry Commission hosted a Lincolnshire Wolds Woodland Event for farmers and landowners on the opportunities for managing and creating woodland across the Wolds, with carbon credits, adding value to timber and landscape issues all discussed. Wolds Hedgerow Survey

19 volunteers have braved all weathers to survey over four kms of hedges this year. This data can be used to inform landowners about the condition of their hedgerow resource, from which management advice is compiled.

Farmstead Assessment Project:

We continue to gather information to help identify and record the condition and character of farm buildings in the Wolds. Information is being collected to help inform a future publication to raise awareness of the historic buildings and their vernacular styles and encourage future sensitive restoration as appropriate.






2022-2023 Grant Schemes



Guided Walks, Events and Shows LinconInshire Wolds Outdoor Festival - LWOF 2022

The LWCS continue to work closely with key partners including East Lindsey (lead partner) and West Lindsey District Councils to help develop and deliver this popular Festival. During 2022 - 2023, the five week LWOF delivered over 200 events with 5,000 people attending and enjoying a range of outdoor activities across the Lincolnshire Wolds. Stourton Estates hosted an Activity Day to launch to the Festival, with plenty of people enjoying walks, dancing and trailer rides in the beautiful warm spring sunshine. Whilst not all events or leaders stayed dry, there were plenty of activities on offer.

Developing the Lincolnshire Wolds

Publications

The Annual Review 2021-22 was published in a digital format, with further revisions and a reprint of the set of four Horncastle Cycling Routes and the 2023 edition of the Making of the Most of the Lincolnshire Wolds. A special edition of Wolds News, our printed newsletter last seen in 2016, was produced and published in March 2023 helping to showcase past achievements and look ahead to the events planned for 2023 to mark the 50th Anniversary of the designation. The launch took place with the branding of 'an AONB since '73' and '50 for 50' with over fifty events planned to help highlight the special qualities of the Lincolnshire Wolds and its' 50 years of national landscape protection. The LWCS also undertook their spring leaflet drop, with over 26,000 leaflets distributed to libraries, tourism outlets and businesses. Further promotion and networking took place during Lincolnshire's destination management group's leaflet swap.





Strategic Policy and Planning

The LWCS has continued to respond on a wide range of strategic plans and development proposals to help ensure the sustainable development of the Wolds and the protection and enhancement of the AONB's nationally important natural beauty. This has included over 25 responses on a wide range of planning applications and reviews of a number of public rights of way orders. The statutory Lincolnshire Wolds AONB Management (2018-23), National Planning Policy Framework and Local Plans provides the framework for our independent observations and subsequent assessment of more substantial planning applications.

Comments have included some concerns on the location and scale of a forthcoming mountain bike park facility near South Willingham; and further formal

objections at the planning hearing on the proposed conventional oil drilling facility at Biscathorpe, with the Inspector's final determination pending.

The LWCS successfully facilitated the AONB Partnership's ongoing review of the current Lincolnshire Wolds AONB Management Plan (2018-23). The responses highlighted successes and other key areas of future project delivery in the context of the AONB staffing unit, the Lincolnshire Chalk Streams Partnership and the wider peer group comprising the Lincolnshire Wolds Joint Advisory Committee (JAC). The current Management Plan has now been "saved", with the preparation on the next review now proceeding, but delayed as we await the roll-out of new government guidance for nationally protected landscapes.

Undergrounding

Planning continued during 2022-23 for the next round of funding via Northern Powergrid & Western Power Distribution on undergrounding for visual improvement in the AONB.

Local Partnerships

The LWCS works alongside a wide range of organisations, local landowners, community groups and volunteers advising on policy and undertaking activity that furthers the interests of the AONB and wider Wolds character area. Over the past 12 months positive links with over 30 local partnerships and initiatives have been maintained and developed; these have included ongoing positive engagement with the Love Lincolnshire Wolds tourism group, the Greater Lincolnshire Nature Partnership and the new South and East Lincolnshire Climate Action Network (SELCAN).

National Partnerships

The Lincolnshire Wolds is one of 46 AONBs in the UK and we have continued to remain actively engaged in wider collaboration across the family of protected landscapes, especially through very positive links via the National Association for AONBs (NAAONB).

The strategic objectives for the NAAONB include:

- Support for policies for conserving and enhancing the natural beauty of AONBs
- Maintain an understanding of AONBs and the issues they face
- Serve as an advocate for AONB partnerships and their teams
- Sustain a collaborative culture across the AONB Family.

The NAAONB has continued to help to coordinate and further opportunities for the family of AONBs, with activity focused on securing:

- Increased recognition by policymakers of the capabilities of AONB teams as convenors
- Increased recognition by policymakers of the knowledge and expertise in the network
- Increased funding with a 15% uplift in Defra income secured for 2022-23
- Wider advocacy on behalf of AONB Partnerships
 Knowledge sharing and collaboration
 - including meeting the new challenges the of biodiversity decline and climate change


- O Increased capacity for the whole network

- Training and development for the network including coordination of the NAAONB three-day conference at Lancaster with the theme The Nation's Landscapes? - Peoples and Places.








Core expenditure 2022 - 23: £264,255


